Using the template on the CD included with the game kit, teachers can add their own content and questions. The game is useful in many ways. Increase enthusiasm, excitement, and learning. Use it in the classroom as a formative assessment, as a teaching tool to review and assess retention, and to spark discussion and interest in the world of nature. Play the game a section at a time to wrap up lessons or to summarize and review a module. Keep games created by different groups of students to use in the future or combine the contents. Students may discover local issues during their research that could lead them to conduct a service-learning project. Students can present what they have learned to other classes and/or to local civic and governmental organizations or have an eco-region night for families and students.


Land On Learning is a game-based framework to challenge and inspire children to better understand and appreciate the land around them, as they learn about the area in which they live Teachers and students both learn about their local environment while creating a game. **Land on Learning** is a game template for learning about the place where they live — their land and their home, because they create it as they learn. This engaging game teaches about the environment culture, and history. The four topics for the game are **Plants**, **People**, **Animals**, and **Water**.





Background

Land On Learning grew out of the Kids On the Land (KOL) program, which was developed in 2003 by Peggy Maddox to provide outdoor, experiential educational experiences for grades K-6. The KOL program has been successfully shared with more than 3,000 students and continues today. However, the number of available sites is limiting. If it is not possible to get children out on the land, that should not preclude their learning about the land where they live. The Land On Learning tool kit gives students, wherever they live and go to school, the opportunity to learn more about their land, plants, animals, wildlife, and water - all that makes their environment special.
